


228 Calls for Service



Note: Response time is measured from the moment a 911 call is picked-up and dispatched to the time our apparatus arrives at your door.


MONTHLY CASE HIGHLIGHT


EMS CALL TYPE BREAKDOWN




TOTAL TRAINING HOURS: YEAR TO DATE

Year to date, ZFD personnel have dedicated a significant number of hours to training across all divisions. These hours reflect our ongoing commitment to skill development, operational readiness, and providing the highest level of service to the community.



TRAINING BY CATEGORY




Above is a summary of the types of training ZFD conducted. Training is categorized into key areas: Engine Operations, Truck Operations, and Technical Rescue. Each category is defined as follows:

- Engine Operations includes training focused on tasks such as hose advancement, hose deployment, and forcible entry.
- Truck Operations refers to training involving victim search and rescue, ventilation, and Rapid Intervention Team (RIT) tactics
- Technical Rescue covers specialized skills like vehicle extrication, rope rescues, urban search and rescue (USAR), and ice rescue.


